



How are we using what has been entrusted to us? Today Jesus tells the parable of the talents. Two of the servants use them to make more; the third buries his in the ground. Are we using our talents as well as we could? As we celebrate the Eucharist today, let us consider how we use our God-given talents and how we could use them more beneficially.

THIS WEEK'S SCRIPTURE LESSON: In the reading from Proverbs, a man finds a trustworthy and praiseworthy partner, one whose value is "beyond pearls." In the Gospel, another man finds trustworthy and praiseworthy servants, ones worthy of handling all his possessions. We would do well to look at ourselves. Does our spouse or close family member consider us trustworthy and praiseworthy? How about our employer? How about God? As we listen to these readings, let us consider how we can become more trustworthy and praiseworthy in the eyes of those whose perspective we value.

**STEWARDSHIP:** The silver pieces of this story stand for a great deal besides money. All temporal and spiritual goods are created by and come from God. That is true of everything human beings have: spiritual gifts like faith, hope, and love; talents of body and brain; cherished relationships with family and friends; material goods; the achievements of human genius and skill; the world itself. One day God will require an accounting of the use each person has made of the particular portion of these goods entrusted to him or her. Each will be measured by the standard of his or her individual vocation.

<u>A REMINDER</u>: I had hoped that we would be able to be back in our two Churches for Masses by November. However, the continued and even increased health risks that Covid-19 is presenting causes me to postpone that decision. I realize that there are many who are not in favor of the continued use of the gyms for Mass, but I must, as the one who is most responsible for the well-being and welfare of the parishioners and visitors, make the difficult decision to remain in the gyms for the time being. I have also decided that the parish halls cannot be rented out during this pandemic time.

A QUESTION FOR THE WEEK: Do I have a gift that maybe I've kept to myself out of fear or apprehension that I could develop and share?

Our special collection for the Catholic Campaign for Human Development (CCHD) will take place on Nov. 21/22. Forty million people in the United States live in poverty, including many in our diocese. This collection supports programs that empower people to identify and address the obstacles they face as they work to bring positive change to their communities. 25% of the collection stays in our diocese to fund local community and economic development projects in economically challenged areas. Richland County CEO, one of our local CCHD grant recipients, teaches youth the skills needed to start their own local businesses and to build a healthy local economy. Schools and PSRs in our diocese also received grants totaling \$3,096 for Catholic Social Teaching and poverty education. The remaining amount of the collection goes to the CCHD national office to fund large grants throughout the nation. This year, over \$135,000 in national funding was given to groups in our diocese to create long lasting economic and community improvements. **Vocation Corner:** — I was stationed overseas in the Navy when a chaplain asked me "Have you ever considered becoming a priest?" My first response was, "Father, did you not just hear my confessions? I'm not cut out to be a priest." Later, I realized that God does not call those who are worthy; he makes worthy those who are called. I was able to respond to the call with help from a Knights of Columbus seminarian scholarship for prospective military chaplains. When sailors and Marines see a Navy chaplain, with the cross on his uniform, they become aware of the presence of Christ. Fewer than 200 priests now serve the 1.8 million Catholics in the U.S. armed services. God is calling men to the priesthood and military chaplaincy. Like my confessor, we can all help plant the seed simply by asking the question.
